

MINERALOGY OF PRECIOUS METAL DEPOSITS - AUG. 12-15, 1988

Dear FM member:

Enclosed are several copies of our final announcement and registration form for the symposium on "Mineralogy of Precious Metal Deposits". Please share this announcement with other persons you know who might be interested.

The symposium will consist of two days of lecture/slide presentations, Aug. 12 and 13, and two days of (optional) field trips, Aug. 14 and 15. We feel we have arranged a wide-ranging and exciting program of talks about the minerals of gold and silver deposits, concentrating on deposits in Colorado. Keynote talks will begin each day's session: "A Review of the Types of Precious Metal Mineral Deposits" by Dr. Samuel B. Romberger on Friday, and "A Review of the Mineralogy of Gold and Silver" by Dr. Phillip C. Goodell and Kathryn Goodell on Saturday. Field trips will visit five classic areas of gold/silver mineralization. There will a banquet Friday evening, at which the featured speaker will be Jack Murphy, curator of geology at the Denver Museum of Natural History. Jack will present "Highlights of Gold and Silver Occurrences in Colorado".

gular registration is \$25, with an additional charge for attending field trips and the banquet; there are reduced registration fees for students and for a spouse or accompanying person. To facilitate our arrangements, we would like attendees to pre-register by August 1, although people may also register in person on either Friday or Saturday, space permitting.





The symposium will emphasize the mineralogy of gold and silver deposits in the State of Colorado. It is sponsored to advance the study of mineralogy and to foster the exchange of information between professionals and amateurs. Papers will range from general and descriptive, or historical, to technical; a volume of abstracts or short texts of all papers, plus field trip guides, will be distributed to registrants at the symposium. Regular registration is \$25.

SYMPOSIUM BANQUET will be held Friday evening at the Rock Rest Inn, 16000 S. Golden Road, Golden. Dinner will be a buffet featuring Baron of Beef, Baked Ham, plus innumerable delicacies. High point of the evening will be Jack A. My hy, Curator of Geology, Denver Museum of Natural History, who will speak on "Highlights of Gold and Silver Occarrences in Colorado". Cost of the banquet is \$15; advance registration (by Aug. 7) is required.

FIELD TRIPS: Five one-day field trips are planned, to be held on Sunday, Aug. 14, and Monday, Aug. 15. Each will include a geologic overview of the trip area, visits to one or more active or inactive mine sites, and some opportunity to collect minerals and ore specimens. Transportation for the trips will be provided by bus or other suitable vehicles; trips will leave the School of Mines Campus at 7:30 a.m. and return by approximately 7:00 p.m. Additional information on the field trips will be available at the symposium. Each trip will be limited to 40 persons, based on the first to sign up; cost is \$15. Information for self-guided trips to other sites of mineralogical and geological interest will be made available as an alternative to the organized field trips.




