Here is what we invite meeting attendees to do:

- \* Bring as many specimens of zeolites and associated minerals as you wish from Colorado or elsewhere.
- \* If you have your own small, portable display cases, please bring them, and we'll have tables on which to set them. We'll have at least one display case from the DMNS Geology Department present.
- \* Bring any copies of books and articles about zeolite minerals that you'd like to show to others.
- \* For those who can, please bring a binocular microscope for viewing micro zeolite specimens.
- \* Together we'll learn about zeolite minerals, including such things as how many Colorado zeolite minerals we can examine, how many world-wide zeolites we bring in, how many "classic" localities are represented, and what "associated" minerals we find.
- \* Bring one zeolite specimen, labeled as to locality (and if you wish, your name), but NOT labeled as to species identity. With these in one case, everyone can try to guess the correct identities of each.

An interesting question is what the current total number of known zeolite mineral species is. The book, "Zeolites of the World", published by Rudy W. Tschernich in 1992, lists 46 zeolite species. The Glossary of Mineral Species (1999) lists 83 different species, with 2 more possible.


# Annual Open House at the Geology Museum, Colorado School of Mines
