

### Friends of Mineralogy Colorado Chapter Board for 2007

At our November 2006 meeting, members present approved the election of the 2007 Board members shown on page 1 of this newsletter. We would like to thank Jack Thompson, who is stepping down from the Board, for his numerous years in serving on the Board and contributing to the success of our organization. Larry Havens will continue to serve in 2007 as our Show Council representative.

### Program Given at the November 2, 2006, FMCC Meeting: Morganite on Mt. Antero

In our November meeting, Jeff Self and Bill Hutchinson made a presentation to our members plus numerous guests about Jeff's discovery of morganite, goshenite, and aquamarine on Mt. Antero in the summer of 2006. The most striking specimen was originally 11<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inches long by 3 inches thick, although when discovered by Jeff it had previously, naturally split perpendicular to the longitudinal axis into several crystal sections, some pink, some white, some blue, some relatively clear, some internally cloudy, all with external corrosion. This crystal, assembled by placing sections together with a few fragments missing, may be the largest beryl crystal discovered

on Mt. Antero. The only Mt. Antero morganite specimen previous to Jeff's was a much smaller single piece.

At least one other, smaller crystal that Jeff discovered has morganite, goshenite, and aquamarine and is mostly gemmy. Other minerals found in the same location are smoky quartz in crystals to 14 inches long, purple fluorite octahedrons to 4 inches tall, muscovite, and albite. Specimens have been undergoing extensive chemical and mineralogical examination. The composition of the crystal(s) does not completely match the normal composition of morganite and aquamarine.

## FM 2007 Annual Members' Meeting and Social, Tucson



#### Aquamarine Pocket, Denver Museum of Nature and Science


In November the Denver Museum of Nature and Science unveiled its latest mineral project, the reconstruction of Diane's Pocket, a 3 foot tall grouping of aquamarine, smoky quartz, and white quartz found on Mt. Antero in the summer of 2004. Steve Brancato found the pieces in a cavity on the southeast side of the mountain, Bryan Lees and Collector's Edge assembled the pieces into the overall pocket, and Bruce and Cody Oreck provided major funding for the total project. It is worth a trip to the DMNS to see this attraction; the black and white photo of the pocket at right is inadequate.



Under the Museum's ownership, the Matchless was open on a more regular daily basis this past summer, and its facilities were expanded to make it more attractive to visitors. It is exciting that Horace Tabor's fabulously rich Matchless mine will be preserved for future generations!
