Mineralogy of the Hiddenite Emerald Deposits

The Hiddenite area of western North Carolina constitutes the most significant emerald-producing district in North America and is the world's premier locality for the chromium-bearing variety of spodumene known as *hiddenite*. Both gem minerals occur in cavities in steeply dipping Alpine-type fissure veins that crosscut highly deformed migmatitic schists and quartz-biotite gneiss of the Inner Piedmont Belt. The primary mineralogy of the cavities consists of quartz, muscovite, various carbonate minerals and rutile. Albite is uncommon, but may be abundant in cavities that host emerald. Zeolites (chabazite), sulfides and clay minerals generally form as part of the last stage of mineralization in the cavities. Although most of the sulfide mineralization is characterized by pyrite, accessory pyrrhotite, sphalerite, chalcopyrite, molybdenite, gersdorffite and trace galena have recently been observed.

Dr. Michael Wise is a research mineralogist/curator with the National Museum of Natural History, Smithsonian Institution and holds a PhD from the University of Manitoba. Mike has worked at the Natural History Museum since 1988 and his research specialty is the mineralogy, petrology and geochemistry of pegmatites. He is currently investigating the mineralogy of the Hiddenite deposits.

From the President, Nov 07

How time flies! As I reflect on my two years as President of the Friends of Mineralogy, Colorado Chapter, I find much to be pleased about, and much to be thankful for.

In 2006, the Board began a process of exploring future options for FM Colorado. In general, the group concluded that the Chapter was doing many things well, but needed to expand its activities and concentrate on expanding its membership base. With great input from the Board and participation by Chapter members, the Chapter has continued to present excellent programs at its meetings.

Under Bruce Geller's expert guidance, we had a record-setting silent auction again this year, with many excellent specimens going to new homes. Pete Modreski again set up our Mineral ID booth, a popular attraction at the Denver Show.

During the past year, the Chapter established a Membership Outreach and Hospitality Committee, to assure that members and guests are welcomed at each meeting, that we ask each guest to sign the Guest book, and that membership information is available. My thanks to Paul Kendall, Kay Thompson and Donna Chirnside for their fine job of getting this under way. Happily, Donna has agreed to chair this important group in the coming year.

Among the priorities established at the 2006 planning session was that we offer educational field trips or Field Symposia, a tour of the Climax Molybdenum mine, and a 2008 Symposium on the minerals of Leadville. These ideas were combined in the very successful Leadville Field Symposium this August. We had 65 participants for the weekend event, from 12 states. Several participants have subsequently joined the Chapter.

I have proposed two additional steps for the Board's consideration. First, I have proposed that we have a Program Committee consisting of a Chairperson appointed by the President and such additional members as the Chairperson may select. Jerry Kieffer has volunteered to serve as Program Chairman for 2008. This step serves two purposes: to relieve the President of this responsibility and to engage more members in the Chapter's activities.

Second, I have proposed that we establish a Preservation Committee whose purpose will be to develop and implement a program of activities to carry out the commitment to preservation set forth in the Chapter's Articles of Incorporation. This commitment includes minerals, localities, and access to localities, and the conservation of important specimen localities and mining deposits by publicizing their history, scientific and educational usefulness in Colorado. I have volunteered to chair this group, and to have a plan of action ready for the Board's consideration by the March, 2008 meeting.

My thanks to the Board for their support, and best wishes to the Chapter's new leadership for 2008.

Mineral Identification



September Denver Show and Colorado Federation of Gem and Mineral Societies

The Denver Mineral Show in September was the best attended and grossed the most gate admissions ever. In fact, attendance was up 5.4% to 11,419 and admissions were up 6.4% to \$39,712. Over 470 volunteers helped run the show. Next year's Denver Mineral show will be headed by Rotha Randall of the Rocky Mountain Bead Society. Our club ran a very busy mineral identification table. Thanks to all of our club members who helped in any way.

One important item from the show that needs discussion is the Colorado Federation of Gem and Mineral Societies. During the show, there was an informal meeting to discuss the demise of the Federation and what should be done about it. Richard Parsons very kindly helped to mediate between two opposing factions at the meeting. I would like to ask you if you think that there should be a Federation. If not, how should its assets be distributed to past member clubs? If so, what should be the role of the Federation? Who wants to lead it? Who wants to go about reinstating it? Should it run the Contin-tail? If not, should it support the efforts of the Contin-tail, LLC? Please let your board members know your feelings on these matters. -- Bruce Geller

From the Director of the Colorado School of Mines Geology Museum

As some of you know, I was appointed the new director of the Colorado School of Mines (CSM) Geology Museum in late August. At the request of some mineral club newsletter editors, I drafted this brief synopsis of my goals for the Museum for insertion in your newsletter. During my first month, I have:

- Created a Suggestion Box, where visitors are encouraged to submit constructive criticism in writing, and they can remain anonymous.
- Generated a Mailing list of interested patrons simply drop a business card, or write your contact information on our form and drop it in the box.
- Submitted a grant proposal to: install signage leading to the Museum, upgrade our website, and improve our Museum brochures.

Some of the changes I would like to make in the near term are:

- To organize an Advisory Council (whose first meeting is scheduled for 10/3) comprised of Dr. John Poate (my supervisor), Jack Murphy, Tom Hughes, Ed Raines, and myself. The Council will be charged with establishing a Museum mission and policy standards with respect to loans, volunteers, donations, de-accessioning, collection management; and strive for accreditation by the American Association of Museums.
- To enlist a small group of volunteers to help with Museum projects.

I look forward to collaborations with other local geology museums such as the DMNS, Dinosaur Ridge, and Morrison, as well as non-geology museums, libraries, and professional societies. Long term, the Museum, the CSM, and the Denver Museum of Nature and Science (DMNS) will host a symposium known as Minerals and Museums (M+M6), which is a conference for international mineral museum curators held every four years, similar to the Olympics. The meeting will occur in September 2008 and will be the first one held in the U.S. I am very excited about this, as is the administration at the CSM, Paul Morgan (earth science curator at the DMNS), and Jim Hurlbut (volunteer extraordinaire at the DMNS). In fact, it was at Jim's urging that M+M6 is being held in Golden!

In conclusion, I wish to invite your club to a private night at the CSM Museum. Simply pick three nights or weekends that your club would like to visit the Museum by itself and have a club representative contact me at: 303-273-3823. I'll try my best to accommodate your club on one of those nights. You're also welcome to visit on your own during our normal hours: Monday – Saturday 9 A.M. To 4 P.M., Sundays 1P.M. – 4 P.M.




