Some new mineral finds, and visits to explore some old localities

In part as a result of Jack's project to research and document gem localities in Colorado, and in the course of preparing for the papers to be given at our "Gemstone Deposits" symposium, Jack and Pete have visited some old, and some fairly new, mineral and gem localities over the past several months. As a bit of a preview to the symposium and the Denver Show, they will share some behind-the-scenes pictures and stories that will go into greater detail than either will be able to do in their talks at the symposium, or in Jack's Saturday night (Sep. 14) talk at the Show. We'll see and hear about Colorado turquoise, peridot, "astorite", and a recent find of "carloads" (well, almost) of beryl excavated from a pegmatite near Bergen Park.



Our Symposium on Gemstone Deposits of Colorado and the Rocky Mountain Region will take place next weekend, Sep. 7-10. All is set for our symposium; there will be a welcoming party Friday evening at the CSM Geology Museum, some 23 talks on Saturday and Sunday morning, a Saturday evening dinner, complimentary tour of the Museum of Nature & Science on Sunday afternoon, and a reception at 5 p.m. Sunday at DMNS. If you haven't registered yet, you can still attend, though the banquet and field trips are just about filled up as this newsletter goes to press. Some 95 people are now registered for the symposium, and we expect more to sign up. You are still welcome to show up Saturday morning and register (\$30) at the door, but an advance registration will assure you of a place and a copy of the abstracts volume—we may even approach the seating capacity of Metals Hall at the Green Center, about 150. For last-minute information about the symposium, please call Pete Modreski (303-202-4766) or Tom Michalski (303-202-4852).

Courtesy of Howard Coopersmith of Great Western Diamond Company, one group from our Monday field trip (those first to register) will tour the Kelsey Lake Diamond mine; others will tour one or more other kimberlite pipes in the area. Tuesday's field trip will be a tour of the Cresson gold mine, courtesy of Dave Vardiman of AngloGold/Cripple Creek Mining. We did not succeed in getting permission to tour one of the turquoise mines at Cripple Creek, but we'll view the location of those deposits, and will spend additional time at the Cresson mine and vicinity.



Copies of our abstracts volume (some 80 pages, including several pages of color photos) will be available for \$15 after the symposium, as the supply lasts; all registrants will receive a copy. A separate field guide to the Kelsey Lake and Cresson mines has been reprinted courtesy of the Society of Economic Geologists, which led a field trip to the same two mines this spring. Registrants for the field trips will receive a copy, and others may purchase one for \$10.

FMCC gratefully acknowledges the grant of \$1200 from the Greater Denver Area Gem and Mineral Council, which has provided \$1200 for printing of the abstracts volume for this meeting. All member clubs of the Council will receive copies of the book. We would also like to express our appreciation to FM member and graphic artist Judy Peterson, who prepared the line drawing of the quartz crystal cluster that we've used as our logo for the symposium on all our advertising and fliers. The specimen (of colorless quartz) is from Red Feather Lakes. We also express our thanks to Marty Zinn, who included an ad about the symposium in his mailing about the Colorado Mineral and Fossil Show, at no charge to FM.
