ROCKHOUND WORKSHOP

October 28–29, 1995 at Omniplex Science Museum, Oklahoma City

Sponsored by: Oklahoma Geological Survey, the Gem and Mineral Clubs of Oklahoma, and Omniplex Science Museum



PURPOSE AND SCOPE—This workshop is intended to bring together rockhounds, educators, the public, and state/federal agencies to discuss topics of concern to amateurs collecting rocks, minerals, and fossils in Oklahoma and surrounding states. Rockhounding is a popular recreational activity throughout the United States, and this will be an opportunity for adults, teachers, and kids to share information on how to collect, prepare, study, and display materials. Kenneth S. Johnson and Neil Suneson, Oklahoma Geological Survey, are the meeting co-chairs.

LOCATION—The workshop will be in the 500-seat Kirkpatrick Center Theater at Omniplex Science Museum, at NE 50 and Martin Luther King Boulevard (see map on back or next page). A large parking lot is available (free), and you can park RVs or campers overnight. Enter through the west entrance (3 flagpoles at doors).

REGISTRATION FEE—Advanced registration (prior to October 6) is encouraged, so we can plan activities. The preregistration fee is \$7 per person, covering the 2-day program, coffee breaks, and a copy of the workshop proceedings book to be published early in 1996. Also, you must pay \$6 for a pass that allows you to visit Omniplex Science Museum during the 2-day Workshop (Omniplex closes at 6 p.m.). So, the total cost is \$13: send a \$7 check to OGS now, and pay \$6 cash at the Omniplex. Registration after October 6 (or on-site) is \$10, plus \$6 to the Omniplex at the door.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT POINTS—As an educational activity, teachers can receive SDPs for 15 hours of credit.

MEALS—No group meals are planned, but a cafe near the theater in Omniplex offers breakfast and box lunches (or other simple lunches) for about \$3–5. Other options include: bring your own lunch and eat in a special luncheon area; or eat at McDonald's, Sonic, or County Line Barbecue—all nearby.

HOUSING—Make your own housing arrangements, if you plan to stay in the Oklahoma City area overnight. Many low-cost to expensive motels (most of the common motel chains) are present in Oklahoma City. Several nearby motels, 3–6 miles NE of Omniplex (on I–35, near Frontier City Theme Park), are: Motel 6 (405/478-8666), Econo Lodge (478-0205), Red Carpet Inn (478-0243), and Holiday Inn (478-0400). Others, located 1.5 mile west of Omniplex on N. Lincoln Blvd., are: Clarion Hotel (528-2741), Comfort Inn (528-6511), and Howard Johnson (528-7563). Prices range from about \$27–55 (single) and \$33–60 (double): try to negotiate a discount.






