

Saturday, July 14 - Green Mountain Cabin Picnic Area, Boulder Mountain Park, 3 miles west of Boulder - 10:00 am to 5:00(?) pm - featuring a guided visit to the "Green Mountain kimberlite"

This Saturday we will be holding a combined picnic and field trip in the foothills west of Boulder. The notice time is rather short, but we will look foward to seeing as many of you as possible to (hopefully) have a pleasant picnic, search for a few minerals, and get to know each other better. As we feast we'll be able to tell true collecting stories and tall tales, and perhaps even get down to planning a more ambitious, future field trip.

To reach the picnic area, drive west on Baseline Road out of Boulder; we will be meeting about 3 miles west of the point at which Baseline Road deviates from its straight west course and begins to switch-back up the canyon. Park at a pull-off area on the left (south) side of the road; this is near the junction at which a road takes off to the right to the Flagstaff Mountain picnic area and monument, and a dirt road (closed off) takes off left and downhill to the Green Mountain cabin. We will have a sign at the parking area, and trail markers on the route to the cabin/picnic area. It is about a 1/4 mile (5-minute) walk from the parking area to the cabin/picnic area: follow the dirt road down the hill, then to the right up the stream valley (Long Canyon) to the picnic area, which is the take-off point for the Green Mountain and other trails. Because of the fair walk, whatever ice chest or picnic basket you take along should be easily portable. We are not renting the use of the Green Mountain cabin (the cost is too great), but there will be outside fireplaces and we will have at least one charcoal fire going for cooking. simplicity, this will be a bring-your-own-food-and-drinks affair.

We will plan to assemble first at the picnic area, then take a short hike to the kimberlite locality. This will be about a 1/2 mile walk which climbs about 250', first following the Green Mountain trail to the top of a ridge, and then taking off cross-country eastward, across a small valley and up the next hill. We'll figure on returning to the picnic area about 1:00 for lunch; any late-comers can show up just for the picnic, or can take an after-lunch walk up to the kimberlite.

This kimberlite is noted mostly for its similarity to the

mamond-bearing kimberlites now being prospected and mined near the colorado-Wyoming line. No diamonds, however, are known to have been found at the Boulder occurrence (does that mean none are there?). The imberlite outcrop is quite fresh, and affords specimens of the *xenocrystal" minerals typical of kimberlite--olivine, pyrope garnet, chrome diopside, ilmenite, and phlogopite--in rounded grains up to bout 1 cm in size. This will be a good opportunity to take a firstmand look at an unusual (and potentially valuable) mineral occurrence; the visit will be led by a team(?) of our kimberlite experts, instigated by Tom Michalski.

Everyone recognizes how hard it is to pick a date in the summer when many people can get together; if you're not otherwise out of town, we'll hope to see you on Saturday!

We are also pleased to report that the Colorado Springs Mineralogical Society has donated \$500 to the Minerals of Colorado project.

COLORADO FEDERATION OF GEM AND MINERAL SOCIETIES FIELD TRIP: to Summitville, Colorado, Saturday, July 21, 1984. The group will meet at the old Summitville townsite at 10:00 am, July 21. Hard hats, safety glasses, and sturdy footwear are required.
