

NOVEMBER MEETING: Thursday, Nov. 15, 7:30 pm, Denver Museum of Natural History. Program: "Porphyry Molybdenum Deposits of Colorado", by Art Bookstrom.

\* \* \* \* Please note--this meeting will be on Nov. 15, not on Nov. 8 as previously announced, due to a scheduling conflict at the museum. \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* Art is a senior geologist with Noranda Exploration, Inc. He was formerly senior project geologist for Climax Molybdenum Co., and has had xtensive experience in the study of, and exploration for, molybdenum deposits in Colorado. Most of our members are probably familiar with the economic importance of molybdenum mining to Colorado, and with a few of the minerals (such as pyrite and molybdenite) found at these deposits. Art's talk will give us the opportunity to learn more about the nature of these molybdenum occurrences: the intrusive igneous stocks which formed the deposits; the sulfides, wolframite, and other minerals which formed by hydrothermal alteration around the stocks; the near-surface veins containing quartz, pyrite, rhodochrosite, sphalerite, and galena; and the regional geologic setting of these ore deposits. As a supplement to Art's talk, members are invited to bring to the meeting specimens of minerals from the Climax, Henderson, and related mines.

BOARD MEETING: Our next Board of Directors meeting will be held Tuesday, Nov. 13, at 6:30 pm, in Jack Murphy's office at the Museum of Natural History. Any interested members are welcome to attend these meetings. Topics to be discussed will include the next (1985) symposium, progress of the Minerals of Colorado Update, and general plans for the coming year.

JANUARY MEETING: Our first meeting of 1985, to be held Thursday, Jan. 10, will feature John Shannon, curator of the Geology Museum, Colorado School of Mines. He will speak on "Minerals of Gilpin County". This was the topic of John's talk at the Colorado Mineral Symposium at the Denver Gem and Mineral Show in September; by popular demand, we are inviting John back to give him the opportunity to speak at greater length and to a larger audience. This meeting will be held in the museum auditorium, and will invite members of other area mineral clubs to the meeting as our quests. Be sure to mention this to your friends who are not FM members.

1984 SYMPOSIUM: Following is a report on the 1984 Colorado Chapter Symposium held at the Denver Council Gem and Mineral Show, Sep. 9, 1984, submitted by symposium chairman Mark Jacobson:

"The results of this year's symposium were surprisingly good considering some negative fears that had been expressed during the previous year. The first talk on Colorado Tarryall Mountains topaz had an audience of 30 people. The audience during the remainder of the talks waried from a low of 15 people to a high of 25 people. All the talks were well organized and well presented.

"Several comments can be added. An accurate conclusion might be that Colorado mineral localities were of greater interest to the audience than other topics, without regard to how beautiful the minerals are or how famous the non-Colorado localities are. Another possible conclusion is that a way to insure greater attendance at future symposiums (if there are any more) would be to increase the overall attendance at the Denver Council Show.

"The last question is, should there be another symposium? If there is be another, should it still be held at the Denver Council Mineral Show? One comment that a previous chairman of the symposium made was that the chairman essentially organizes and runs the symposium as he or she sees fit. After this symposium, I can see the obvious truth of this statement. So, there will be another symposium, if a new chairman volunteers for it; and the new chairman will determine how and where the next symposium will be run."
