I have been collecting minerals for 30 years, starting in Michigan at the age of 9. The real collecting started when my family moved to Vista in San Diego County, California. I was captivated by the beauty of the Pala pegmatite minerals, and set out to collect in many places. I collected at many of the mines and small prospects in San Diego County. During high school, I spent countless days digging pegmatites in California and Mexico.

Upon graduating high school, I enrolled at the Colorado School of Mines in Golden, Colorado. While there I extensively collected throughout Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Arizona, New Mexico, Arkansas, Mexico, and Montana. I even managed to graduate in four years, with an Engineering degree.

I consider myself a field collector first and foremost, with purchasing of minerals for the collection secondary. Even today, I spend many days each year field collecting, albeit less than in my past.

Ryan Bowling:

Ryan is an Engineer by formal education, having graduated in 1996 with a B.S. Engineering from the Colorado School of Mines, and a self-taught pegmatite specialist. For the past 23 years he has been working in the field of Industrial Automation to support his mineral endeavors. While at the Colorado School of Mines, Ryan was the Field Trip Chairman for the Association of Geoscience Students. Ryan has been heavily involved in many mining projects with his mining partner Paul Geffner, the most recent one being the Jackson's Crossroads amethyst mine. He continues to be an active field collector. who is passionate about the exploration of new localities.



Growing up in Vista and San Clemente, California, Ryan Bowling has spent countless hours collecting the Stewart, Chihuahua Valley, and Little Three Mine pegmatites. Learning from southern California miners such as Louis Spaulding Jr., Byron Weedge, Blue Shepard, along with exposure to the great collections assembled by Bill Larson, Cal Graeber, Chuck Houser, and the L.A. County Museum of Natural History. Ryan developed an appreciation of southern California pegmatite minerals and a field-level knowledge of complex gem crystal pegmatites, Pala was Ryan's home away from home until he officially moved to Colorado, where he uncovered many beautiful pockets.

Ryan will take us through an overview of the famous mines and claims of the Pala District, reviewing some of Pala's most famous finds.





FMCC Chapter member deceased: William Ross Moore, Lake Jackson, Texas, 1938-2019

A member of our chapter for some years, but with whom I believe not many members were acquainted, William Ross Moore passed away on July 27, 2019, at the age of 81; we just learned of his death. As you'll read below, William had a serious interest in San Juan Mountains mining history and minerals, and I believe he first joined our chapter after attending one or both of our symposia that took place in the San Juans, either the one in Creede (2010) and/or the one in Ouray (2014).

The following is extracted from his obituary published at https://www.dignitymemorial.com/obituaries/clute-tx/william-moore-8792721:

"After graduating from Southwest Texas State, he immediately began his career with the Dow Chemical Company in Freeport, retiring 28 years later as a senior research leader. He was a "hands-on" technical chemist and designed and built numerous mini and pilot plants. Holder of 13 U.S. and several foreign patents, he made significant contributions to Dow's monomer/polymer processes/ production.

"Ross's main hobby was mineralogy, specializing in the minerals of the San Juan Mountains in Colorado. He donated his 7000 volume Mining History Library of the American West to the Ouray County (Colorado) Historical Society Museum and his mineral collection to the Creede Colorado Underground Mining Museum for public use. He donated his mining ore samples to Texas A&M Geology Department."
